FROM THE CITY MANAGER

As I write this article, Gilpin County has placed additional restrictions on our casinos to slow the transmission of Covid-19 during the second wave of the virus. Although the restrictions adversely impacted our casinos, the casinos are finding ways to survive in this uncertain environment. The good news is a vaccine is just around the corner, and by the time this newsletter has been distributed, some doses of the vaccine will likely have been distributed to our most at-risk populations.

As we close out 2020, it's important to reflect on the City's accomplishments as we head into the new year. Several projects in the City have been completed or near completion. The new Hidden Treasure Trailhead and Maryland Mountain Quartz Valley Park are now open to the public, the Saratoga Valet parking lot is finished, and the Lodge public parking lot is complete. The Monarch Hotel and Casino is partially open, and the entire project should be finished within the next few months. The Gregory Plaza is making a magical transformation with a completion date in mid-summer. The Proximo Whiskey Distillery Resort took a step toward becoming a reality after Proximo Spirits purchased the land needed to develop their resort.

On December 1, 2020, the Black Hawk City Council approved additional casino games and lifted the wagering limits. The City was the first of the three gaming communities to add games and raise limits after local and state voters approved ballot questions in November, giving local communities more control over gaming. Now, the Gaming Commission will develop new rules for the authorized games and bet limits. Our guests should see the changes on May 1, 2021.

The City has been working with a developer to create a distillery district and 50-unit airstream park on the Mesa. A new distillery is already being planned for the distillery district. The City is also developing a sewer line to support the new distillery district and airstream park and any new development in the area. Construction of the new development will start in 2021. The City has several other development plans that were delayed in 2020 due to the economic impact of COVID-19. When the economy improves, those projects will be restarted in 2022. The City Council also approved changing the name of Highway 119 in Black Hawk to Clear Creek Boulevard, and residents and guests will see new signage in the next few months.

Our goal is to create a "one-of-a-kind experience" for visitors and make Black Hawk a "Resort Destination." 2020 was a challenging year, but 2021 will be a great opportunity to get back on track. So, buckle up, as change happens fast in Black Hawk.

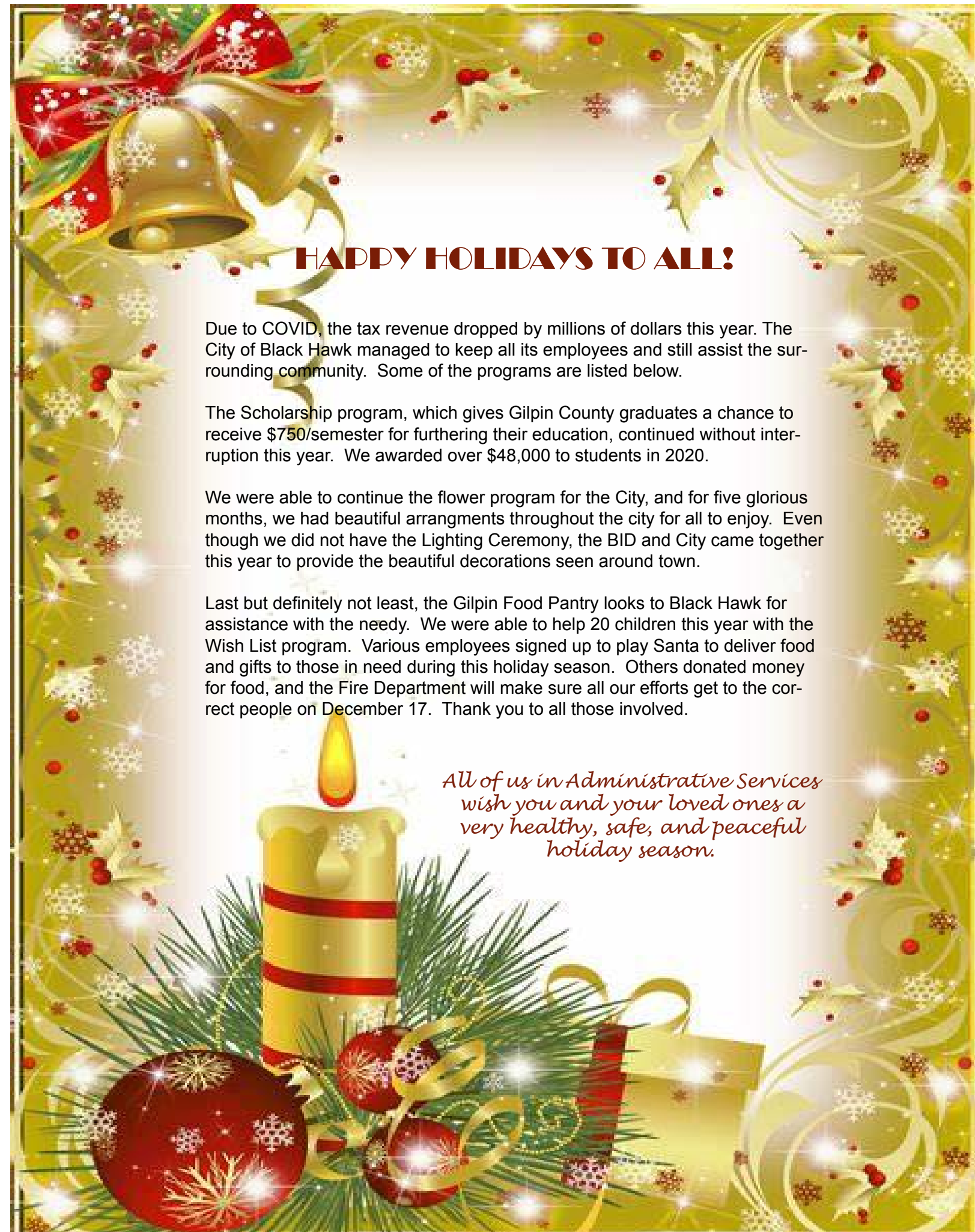

Last but definitely not least, the Gilpin Food Pantry looks to Black Hawk for assistance with the needy. We were able to help 20 children this year with the Wish List program. Others donated money for food, and the Fire Department will make sure all our efforts get to the correct people on December 17. Thank you to all those involved.

INTERACTIVE CEMETERY MAP

In the mid-1900s, the City of Black Hawk purchased the Dory Hill Cemetery. The documentation associated with the existing headstones is limited and has caused confusion throughout the years.

The latest thought is to provide, to the public, an interactive map of the cemetery. This map will be loaded on to the new website so that by clicking on a name in a green square, you will automatically view a picture of the headstone and all documents related to that person and family plot.

The Cemetery is absolutely gorgeous in the Spring with flowers blooming. Walking around a cemetery may seem like a bizarre thing to do, but reading the headstones and seeing the dates of those passed tell numerous historical and interesting stories. The cemetery is located off Hwy 46, just down from Hwy 119.

- Drone light shows can number from as few as 100 drones to as many as over 2000 drones
- The lights can display more than 1.8 billion color combinations.
- The drones are all controlled by one mighty central computer with just one operator.
- The drones can create stunning shapes, words, logos, dazzling animations, and the entire performance is synchronized to a custom musical soundtrack.
- Drone light shows are made up of small drones with high powered led lights on them.

BELLS OF BLACK HAWK

Schulmerich Carillons

Ernest Hemingway wrote, “For Whom the Bell Tolls,” a woeful tale of a man at war during the late 1930s. The English poet, John Donne, says this about bells: “Any man’s death diminishes me because I am involved in Mankind, and therefore never send to know for whom the bell tolls; it tolls for thee.”

In Black Hawk, we have a different philosophy. The Bells of Black Hawk sing songs of patriotism and hope every hour, offering inspiration to those in range. With the new Schulmerich Carillon g5 system that replaced our 20yr old system, we now hear the chimes with enhanced clarity and tone.

Mayor David Spellman has organized the musical menu featuring the national anthem at 8 am, 12 pm and 4 pm. A mixture of patriotic songs fills the rest of the day on the hour, every hour. Mayor Spellman had this to say: “Black Hawk citizens are patriotic and value their freedom and liberty. Playing the Star-Spangled Banner and other patriotic music is one way to demonstrate and share our love and gratitude for our Country with all the folk who visit Black Hawk. Listening to our National Anthem as the American flag waves from our Liberty Pole gives one an immense feeling of pride, and you think to yourself, I am proud to be an American.”

One of the most interesting things about this unique Black Hawk feature is that we are not listening to bells at all. Electronic devices, such as the Schulmerich g5, can imitate precise bell tones offering us the ability to listen to True Cast Bells, Flemish Bells, English Bells, Celesta Bells, Organ Chime, Harp Bells, Quadra Bells, and Tembrel Bells. We looked, there are no Cow Bell offerings.

During the holiday season, the National Anthem will continue to play at the designated hours, and holiday music will fill the rest of the hourly strikes.



“The old system was all manual. The new system is all digital and much easier to maneuver around. The new speakers sound much better than the older system. We also have more songs to choose from, and everything is already pre-programmed. The new system also has an annual calendar, so we don’t have to change the music manually. 2021 Annual Budget

With the New Year fast approaching, that means it is time to visit the City of Black Hawk 2021 Annual Budget.

On November 11, 2020 the Black Hawk City Council held a work-session to review the 2021 Proposed Annual Budget.

With the reality of the COVID-19 public health emergency continuing into 2021, City officials have had to plan accordingly. The 2021 Budget maintains City services at current levels and holds fees at 2020 levels. Budgeted Revenue for 2021 is projected to be down over 30% from 2019 actuals.

The 2021 Budget includes minor to moderate decreases in Operating expenditures and personnel. Between reducing operational expenditures, freezing vacant positions and delaying certain capital projects, the City's fiscal situation continues to be healthy. Even with a slimmed down budget, the City is in a very fortunate position to be able to provide, on a temporary basis, the high level services the citizens, business' and guests of Black Hawk have come to expect.

Community Planning and Development

Residential Building Permit

The City of Black Hawk requires residents to obtain building permits when they are making additions or alterations to existing structures and for all new structures. Building permits are required to ensure the safety and wellbeing of our residents. Improper installation of building materials or mechanical appliances can cause harm to those living in the home, or unnecessary damage to the structure. Your safety and wellbeing is so important to the City that there is NO cost to the resident! The City pays our building consultants to complete the required plan review and inspections.

The following require a building permit:

- New building (home or accessory structure such as a shed)
- Additions
- Re-roof
- Mechanical appliance installation or replacement (water heater, furnace, A/C, unit heater)
- Gas line installation or modification
- New light fixtures or additional electrical wiring (fixture replacement exempt)
- Plumbing fixture or new water line installation (fixture replacement exempt)
- Drywall repairs 4 feet x 8 feet or larger

Each climb remembers a hero and helps the FDNY Counseling Services Unit and National Fallen Firefighters Foundation assist their families.

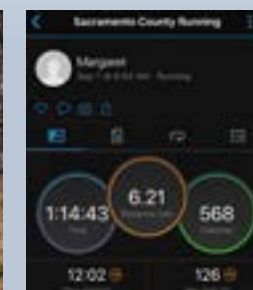
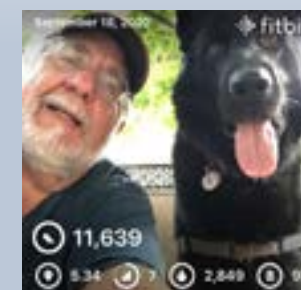
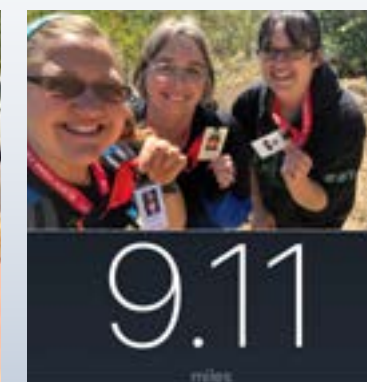

Christmas tree and decoration fires

Carefully decorating your home can help make your holidays safer.

Between 2013-2017, U.S. fire departments responded to an average of 160 home fires that started with Christmas trees per year. U.S. fire departments responded to an estimated average of 780 home structure fires per year that began with decorations, excluding Christmas trees.

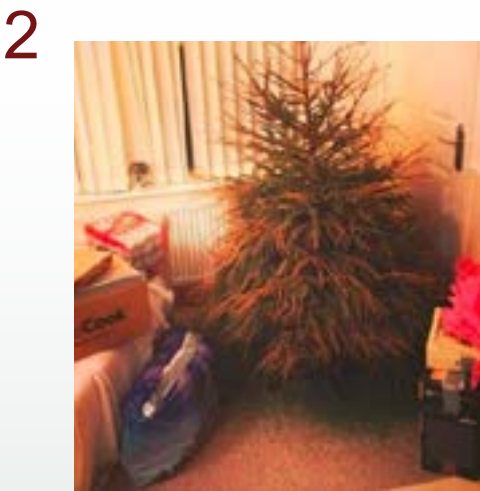

Your cat lets you know he's delighted you've finally bought some great toys!



Keep pets and children at least three feet away from burning candles and electrical cords to prevent burns and electrical fires.



2
That ever-growing pile of fallen pine needles on the floor is receiving more comments than the decorations for your Christmas tree.

A dry tree in your home is a fire danger. Think of it as a huge pile of kindling in your home. Choose a tree with fresh, green needles that do not fall off when touched.



3
You've spent more time trying to free yourself out of the tangled lights than actually decorating the tree.

Check the manufacturer's instructions to find out how many lights can be connected to prevent electric shock and fire.



4
You know it's bad to put flammable material near a fire, but you can't help yourself. These stockings just look so darn cute and festive!

Keep anything that can burn away from a heat source, despite how awesome it looks. Flameless candles are also a great alternative to real ones when decorating.



5
Your house is a holiday tourist attraction and you could not be prouder.

An overloaded electrical outlet is a major fire hazard. Plug strings of lights directly into the wall and keep the number to a minimum.

Some of the bulbs on your string of lights have already taken time off for the holidays.

Replace any string of lights that has worn or broken cords or loose bulb connections. These can easily start a fire.

You've remembered to keep yourself well hydrated, but the same can't be said for your



Christmas tree.

Always keep water in the tree stand. Check daily and add water as needed. Dried-out trees are a major fire hazard.

You're sure those strings of Christmas lights make the perfect hat to complement your holiday outfit.

Some lights are only for indoor or outdoor use, but not both. And most certainly, not for your head.

You've been lazy about disposing your Christmas tree so you got creative and came up with a new tradition: a Valentine's Day tree!

Dried-out trees are a fire danger and should not be left in the home or garage, or placed outside against the home. Check with your local community to find a recycling program.

INFORMATION TECHNOLOGY

COVID WEB TRAFFIC STATISTICS

The effects of the Coronavirus on technology has led to an increase in Internet demand through adaptation of modern workplace practices as well as a rapid transition to remote work; the increase in service usage is demand-driven. The switch to remote work, learning, meetings, conferences this year all had one thing in common that is in-person was going to be limited.

Cloudflare provides data showing a 10% reduction in Office traffic versus a 20% increase for home users, and here are some of the reason's bandwidth use has grown.

Virtual Meetings

In December of 2019, Zoom had 10 million daily meeting participants fulfilling the needs of some savvy spread-out companies; after April 2020, which saw a 3000% increase, the count grew to over 300 million. Other platforms that significantly increase usage are Teams, WebEx, and Go To Meeting. Virtual Meetings were not just for school/business but also fitness, art, cooking, and other virtual social gatherings.



Video Streaming Usage

With the work/school increase, more people working from home also translates to more downtime. From decreased commutes, productivity boosts that lead to more rest and reduced working hours due to budgetary concerns. Web metrics show estimates that news viewing increased ~%67 while movies and TV shows went up ~%51.

Video Games

Platform usage can also be measured by the community surrounding it, similar to the way advertisers track marketing interaction is how Neilson is calculating the surge in video gaming activity. Twitch streaming, a platform primarily used by video gamers, had its usage double during the months of Jan 20' to Mar 20'. This metric is an indication that not only more time was being spent playing games but also watching others play.

PUBLIC WORKS

GREGORY STREET PLAZA UNDER CONSTRUCTION

The Gregory Street Plaza project consists of reconstructing five historic buildings, constructing two new buildings, rehabilitating the exterior of the historic Methodist church, and extensive site and utility work.

The Gregory Street Plaza will further Black Hawk's emergence as a resort destination by creating a pedestrian-friendly retail district along Gregory Street. A sound system will be installed throughout the Plaza to accommodate outdoor events.

PUBLIC WORKS

Contractors are painstakingly restoring the McAfee, Woodbury, and Norton Houses, as well as the Bobtail Mine building and Bunkhouse, to retain their historic value.



The Bobtail Mine building (left) will be used for ticket sales and a small museum when the City reopens the historic Bobtail Mine for tours. The Bunkhouse (right) will be used as a set of restrooms. The Bunkhouse, also affectionately referred to as the 'Chicken Coop', was relocated approximately 750' up Gregory Street from its previous location. The construction project should be complete by June 1, 2021. Then, the City can begin hosting outdoor events and wooing businesses to occupy the historic buildings in the Gregory Street Plaza.
